Oil be damned: HOUSTON ART

Who would have thought that Houston, Texas was a hotbed of underground talent? Let's face it, it doesn't look promising. Houston is a town originally built on oil money and the 42nd President of the United States has his ranch down the road in Crawford – surely enough to quell any cultural stirrings before they get on their feet. But Houston has a thriving underground art scene, which is fuelled by such local institutions as the \$80 million art space The Beck Building (built by the minimal architect Raphael Moneao), The Glassell School (with teachers like Francesca Fuchs and Frazier Stables) and a multi-millionaire art patron in the shape of former Ze Records honcho Michael Zilkha. Smaller galleries like Artscan and Fotofest continue to push groundbreaking shows, and the Contemporary Arts Museum (CAM) showcases major artists like Bill Viola, Cindy Sherman, Philip Taaffe and Matthew Barney throughout the year.

With one eye on the city's galleries, characters, hangouts and dropouts, Dazed called on local artist Al Saulso to get a handle on Houston and to discover what the hell happens when Dubya's tucked up safely in bed with his cocoa and WMD manual. AP
